How well do you Google?

Are you Googling the best you can? Perhaps not. If you don't know all the ins and outs of www.google.com, you might want to take the tutorial at www.googleguide.com. You will be surprised what you will learn.

For example, you can force Google to include a term by preceding the term with a "+" sign. Want to learn about Star Wars Episode One? "I" is a stop word and is not included in a search unless you precede it with a + sign. Use Star Wars +I, not Star Wars I.

To leave a term out of the search, precede each term you do *not* want to appear in any result with a "-" sign.

The site has a chart that explains basic searching, which also works with all search engines.

Now, you can also Froogle. Froogle, new from Google, makes it easy to find stores that sell the item you want to find.

To use Froogle, click the Froogle top link on Google or go directly to the [Froogle home page](#). Type in the name of the item you want and click on "Froogle Search." You'll also see product reviews and store ratings to help you make better purchasing decisions.

Example: It took 0.07 seconds to find 51 places where SAS shoes could be bought. Some 45,000 sites were found for Compact Flash card in 0.60 seconds.

Q: I installed AAA Roadwise Review without problems, but was not able to run it because of the message STARTUPEXE - Bad Image. Later the explanation "Generic Host Process for WIN32 Services encountered a problem and needed to close" appeared. What can I do? Thanks. --Beth

A: It sounds like spyware. Beth needs to download from www.download.com Ad-Aware 1.06, Spyware Blaster 3.4 and Spybot Search & Destroy 1.4. Run all three letting them delete all know objects they fine. Also, she needs to pull down all the Microsoft Security updates. Plus delete all temp files and Temporary Internet Files. That's a start. Some spyware is tuff to get out. —Tim Johnson

Q: Is there a limit to the amount of information I can put in an e-mail message?

A: You want to keep e-mail under 1 meg so it flows through e-mail locations efficiently.
